#### Dear Donors & Supporters,

Thank you very much for your cash donation of £200 and your regular donations of food. This is very kind of you.

The food donations continue to contribute towards food parcels for destitute asylum seekers and asylum seeking families living on £5 a day support from the Home Office. We also distribute toiletry packs each month and are very lucky that almost all of the emergency provision we hand out is made up of donations. Thank you for your support.

Last year the donations we received helped us to provide 2400 food parcels and 600 toiletry packs to destitute asylum seekers, 4800 hot meals to people accessing the PAFRAS drop-in and 1372 case work and support session to adult asylum seekers. 63 young people (aged 16-24) received case work from our Young Migrants Matter Project.

We held a warm Christmas party in December at the PAFRAS drop-in. We had live music from a fantastic two-piece Satnam Galsian and Luke Darlinson, the amazing Roundhay Ukulele Group got everyone in the Christmas spirit and there was even some dancing. Our very own Volunteer Coordinator, Emma McKee, performed with her band the Brigadista Collective. We distributed food parcels and Christmas presents to destitute asylum seekers and gave out toys and gifts to children. It was such a lovely atmosphere.

We look forward to sharing news about the important and vital work we do in 2020.
