## **Letter from Alex**

### Greetings in the name of the Risen Christ!

I recently used the hymn "For the joys and for the sorrows", Source 110, in a service and it got me thinking...

Have you ever noticed that when Jacob wrestles with the angel in Genesis 32 God afterwards declares his new name to be Israel, but then throughout the New Testament Jacob is still referred by both his old name and new one? Have

you ever wondered why Jesus being from the line of David is important when David was, at the time, a much derided and unpopular old king? Have you ever wondered why God would make being a disciple of his so difficult when we are promised such favour?

This month I have had to battle with these thoughts. I have been shaken to my very core with such force that I have had to ponder if I'm actually good enough to do the work I try to do. The good news is that all is well and there are some very humbling reasons for the above anomalies.

For any of us to truly flourish in any walk of life we must accept our limitations. We must accept that sometimes we have skeletons in the closet, insecurities and old wounds we'd rather not poke with. But when God declares himself the Lord of Israel and the God of Jacob, we need to hear what God is telling us. God wants to take ownership not just of the good stuff but also the bad stuff in our lives; he is not only God of the mountain but God of the valley. He is not only the light in the darkness, but the shade in the scorching heat. Jacob had to accept being Jacob before he could become Israel, so we must accept our less favourable traits to let the better ones be blessed.

As a family of believers we need to thank God for all the blessings we have received, be it through our church work or our home and secular lives. We also need to acknowledge the role God has played in our dark times, of which we have all had many.

In 2020 Wigton Moor Church will see many changes, opportunities and challenges. Not just with the bricks and mortar but also with our personnel and friends around us. We have to work out our place in the Leeds Partnership, who we choose to lead and govern us and discern where God is taking us in the future. This is an equally exciting and terrifying prospect!

So, join me and the elders as we take the next steps in our process, filled with the knowledge that God is with us, whether we are Jacob or Israel.

### **Church News**

We were privileged to welcome the Revd. Kevin Watson, Yorkshire Synod Moderator, to lead worship at our church Anniversary Service on 1 December. Following the service, Kevin and his wife Lynne joined us for a faith lunch and fellowship. Later the same day the Christmas lights outside church and the shops, kindly provided by Harewood Parish Council, were switched on, and the church was open for mulled wine and mince pies. We were amazed at the number of people who turned up, including a number of young families, which was very encouraging. There was also an opportunity to sing some carols, so all in all it was a very happy occasion, and hopefully will become an annual event. The total amount for the anniversary gift day was £2345 plus £478.75 in gift aid, making a total of £2823.75. Thank you to all those who responded.

The festive Community Coffee Stop on 17 December was another successful event, this time in the form of afternoon tea with various goodies on individual cake stands. There were plenty of elves to serve the mulled wine, tea and coffee, and when Santa Claus arrived he had his own elf helper to distribute the gifts. It was obvious that so much careful planning and preparation had taken place to organise this, and a big thank you to all those who were involved in any way. We, as a church, are fortunate that a number of people from the local community give up their time each Tuesday to help in different ways, and enjoy being involved.

The Service of Lessons and Carols on 22 December was led by Alan and very well attended. A number of visitors joined us, including some people from the community who regularly join us on a Tuesday afternoon at the Coffee Stop.

Moira led the short service on Christmas morning. All four of the Advent candles were again lit and, for the first time, included the centre white candle representing Jesus, the Light of the World. We then followed our tradition of opening the practical gifts for church and reading the cards from various friends. One of the cards contained greetings from Gloucester, which was signed from Peter, Julia, Nathan and Pierce along with a copy of their church magazine.

The collection for Dementia UK, which was our chosen Christmas charity, amounted to £301.60. This was made up to £350 from church funds. Thank you to all who supported this appeal.

The "small change" collection during 2019 amounted to just over £100, which was made up to £150 from church funds, and sent to Caring for Life. The amount collected has dropped considerably compared to a few years ago. Not everybody may be aware that there is tin in the coffee bar each week where 1p, 2p and 5p coins can be collected. The charity for 2020 is Yorkshire Air Ambulance, so let's aim to increase last year's amount in order to benefit this worthy cause.

We now know that in early December, Gladys was transferred from hospital in Leeds to a nursing home in Stockport, close to her son Mark. We pray that she is comfortable and able to enjoy visits from her family.

Audrey was discharged from hospital at the end of November, and we are pleased that she recovered enough to go on her planned cruise towards the end of December. She is now safely home after experiencing some rough weather conditions!

Margaret Sykes' niece has been in touch to let us know that, sadly, Margaret died on 12 January in the Radcliffe on Trent nursing home where she had been very well cared for in the last few months of her life. She had become very frail and lost a lot of weight, but apparently spent her last few weeks surviving on a diet of chocolates and diluted wine!

We have fond memories of Margaret and send our sympathy to her niece at this sad time. The final paragraph in the niece's letter reads "We have a local man Canon Haydock taking the funeral service and he has visited her in her home as we asked and is a lovely man. We would be grateful if you would convey the news to all at the church who knew Margaret and again give them our thanks."

Congratulations to Alison Devlin and Stuart Cross who were married in Leeds on 10 January. We were delighted that Mr and Mrs Cross(!) joined us for worship on 12 January before returning to Wolverhampton. We wish them every blessing in the years ahead, and hope that they will manage to visit us from time to time.

Looking ahead, our Church AGM will be on Sunday, 5 April following a faith lunch. This is always an important meeting at which our church reports are presented, so a good attendance would be appreciated. The various reports will need to be sent to Trevor by the middle of February, in order for them to be included in the March copy of Proclaim.

## **Fundraising Update**

Start of a new church year and the Fundraising & Publicity Committee are organising a lot of events over the next few months. The High Ash Drive Christmas Light switch on was a lovely event, we completely underestimated how many local people turned up ,but it was a lovely atmosphere & next time we will be more prepared.

Before Christmas we were contacted by Bernard Sunley Charitable Foundation & we have been successful with our grant application and they are pledging £10k which was a great boost for the committee. Also in December another grant was submitted to Veolia (waste collection), and we expect feedback in March.

Six members of Synod came to the church and met Alex, Moira, Alan, Drew and Sheena who put a case forward to try and get Synod to support us financially and match what the church and community have raised already. A lot of extra information needed to be submitted and queries answered, thankyou to Drew for dealing with this. We await their outcome towards the end of March, but they were very encouraging of the mission work we are doing already.

'Hot off the press' is that we have just had news of another successful grant application from the Emmerdale Fund who are pledging £25k.
